Message from James Potter, Nelson Potter Ltd

As you may know we have operated from our premises in the parish for many years and with our commitment and welfare to all staff, visitors, and general public we have installed a defibrillator on site.

I thought it might be beneficiall to advise that this has been installed beside our sales yard gate (On the external side). This is stored within an industry standard de-fib cabinet - this is a key coded box.

We have registered this with the national database (Circuit), so can be accessed by anyone calling the emergency services – all that is needed is the caller's location.

We hope that the need for use will never arise, however

in the unfortunate event that it should then we hope this vital piece of lifesaving equipment will give the best possible chance to save a life.

BENTLEY WILDLIFE NOTES

The English Oak Tree

Bentley has sadly lost two of its large mature Oak trees recently, at the hands of developers and landowners. One of the trees was at least 350 years old (as estimated by counting growth rings), the most recent 200 years by ring count. Unfortunately, neither was protected by a Tree Preservation Order (TPO) although one was being fast-tracked to protect it.

Oak trees are important landscape and heritage features in the countryside and in the Village. There is an adage that an English Oak (Quercus robur) takes 300 years to grow, 300 years as a mature tree and 300 years to die. In the meantime, they are host to or provide sustenance for thousands of wildlife species – more than 400 insect species that live on their bark or foliage, those birds and others preying on them, and mosses, lichens and insects and fungi dependent on their fallen leaves and wood. The biodiversity they support increases with the age of the tree. In cutting down a mature tree you are betraying our ancestors who planted it, our current generation who enjoy such majestic features in the landscape, and the future generations who will have lost their heritage. A replacement oak will take many years to become a comparable specimen. At present the treescape of the East Anglian countryside is fast losing all its mature Ash trees, through Ash die-back, and in the last 50 years has lost nearly all its English elms, so beloved of John Constable, through Dutch Elm disease. Firs and Silver birches are temporarily pretty but do not offer a significant enduring statement.

Regrettably, with increased density of infill housing and with very small gardens there is seen to be less room for larger trees, and increasingly, it seems that further trees will be seen to be 'in the way' of development. **Michael Bamford**



Bentley Village Playing Field Boundary - Habitat Protection

Grateful thanks to those who respect and look after the habitat around the edge of our village playing field. In recent years, trees and shrubs have been planted, bird and bat boxes have been erected, and the boundary improved by introducing wildflower seed, all helping to increase biodiversity.

Regrettably, however, in the last couple of years, branches have been broken off the large Buddleia (Butterfly bush) which grows alongside the storage container thus reducing the number of flowers and the nectar they produce that butterflies feed on. In summer, butterflies that have been seen feeding at these Buddleia flowers include Red Admiral, Painted Lady, Comma, Peacock, Meadow Brown, Large White, Small White, Green-veined White and Gate Keeper.

We respectfully ask that the playing field boundary habitat is protected for wildlife.

Matters discussed:


- Grants for insertion into the Budget were agreed

Citizens Advice Column

As the weather has turned colder, I've noticed mould and damp in our flat. It's mainly in our bedroom, including some black mould on the carpet. I've been chasing our letting agency, who say they'll speak to our landlord. I'm really worried about how this might affect our health. Our tenancy agreement isn't up for eight months, what can I do?



It's good that you've already raised the issue with your letting agency. Unfortunately, it isn't always easy to work out the cause of mould or damp This can make it difficult to work out if your landlord is responsible, unless there's an obvious cause, like a leaking roof.

There are many causes of damp that properties can get. The most common are rising, penetrating, construction and condensation damp. On our website www.citizensadvice.org.uk there is information that may help you work out what type of damp you have, who is responsible and what you can do. Check your tenancy agreement too for mentions of repairs and damp and reach out to Citizens Advice on anything you're unsure about.

A landlord will have to act in relation to damp if it makes the property unsafe for someone to live in. This could be for example, if it is making the tenant or a member of their family ill. The landlord will also be responsible if the damp is related to repairs they should have carried out, like if heaters are broken. If the damp has damaged items that the landlord is responsible for, such as carpets and window frames, they'll likely have to cover the cost of repairs.

One of the most common causes of damp is condensation. To prevent this, it's important to keep homes well-heated and well-ventilated, but for a lot of people this will be trickier to do given the colder weather and higher heating costs. You may be eligible for help to insulate and heat your home and should visit our website to find out more.

On our website we also have advice on things that can make damp worse and may impact the landlord taking responsibility for repairs. These include drying clothes on heaters or blocking air vents.

If your landlord is responsible for the damp in your property but doesn't act, there are steps you can take, such as reporting them to the local authority. If you're in social housing, you might also be able to use the landlord's formal complaints procedure. There is more information about this on our website. If it reaches the point where you want to get out of a fixed term tenancy agreement early, do speak to an adviser first, as there might be better ways to approach the issue.
